

The American Otological Society is one of the oldest societies within otolaryngology and it is an absolute honor to serve as President alongside my fellow Council members this year. One of our privileges is to promote scientific discovery dedicated to the mission that all may hear. To that end, we are delighted to report that the AOS Foundation is very strong with over thirteen million dollars in its endowment; allowing us to fund over \$400,000 in research grants primarily to young investigators. I'd like to thank Andrea Vambutas, MD, for her leadership as Executive Secretary of the Research Advisory Board. Each board member offered their time and expertise in careful review of each application and meeting to determine funding priorities. You will find their names highlighted in the Research Board Report included in this newsletter and I hope you too will find time to thank them for their important service.

In addition, I'd like to take time in my message to share with you a three-part initiative that the AOS council has undertaken this year, in concert with an outside development consultant.

First, a little background. Historically the AOS functioned primarily to foster dialogue and dissemination of information to its members pertaining to advances in evidence-based diagnostics and management of otologic and neurotologic disorders. And while these remain as worthy goals for the society, we also acknowledge that we've become grateful beneficiaries of time and generosity allowing for the expansion of our imprint on the field. Over 90 years ago, two otologists forged a legacy that will last for generations by establishing an endowment within the society. In the years since, the wise stewardship of council leadership has grown the fund to its current value allowing us to support the research of many promising investigators.

Which leads us to the present work at hand. Our initiative seeks to amplify our efforts by **creating a logo, refreshing the website and raising the overall engagement of our membership.**

The AOS has already developed a modern appearing logo to complement our traditional seal, developed when such seals were used to authenticate documents. 
A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT (cont)

Otology & Neurotology, Inc. is seeking a new Editor-in-Chief (EiC) for *Otology & Neurotology (O&N)* for a five-year term effective July 2026. The incoming EiC will be announced in Q4 2025. In early 2026, the incoming EiC will begin training for the role while working alongside the current EiC, Lawrence R. Lustig, MD during the transition period.

Position Summary

O&N is the official journal of the American Otological Society (AOS) and the American Neurotology Society (ANS) and is affiliated with several other international organizations. *O&N* plays a pivotal role in driving the research agenda and research education in otology, neurotology, and cranial base surgery. The EiC sets the editorial direction and has final authority for the selection and quality of all content published in *O&N*, a journal committed to the rapid dissemination of important and enduring discoveries relating to the human ear and its diseases. As such, the EiC is expected to have a broad knowledge of the specialty and will have a clearly articulated vision for *O&N*. The broadly international character of *O&N*'s contributing authors, editorial board, and readership provides the Journal its decidedly global perspective.

Applications

Interested candidates may apply for the *O&N* EiC position by submitting an application package including their **curriculum vitae and a letter of interest summarizing their qualifications and describing their vision for *O&N* (2 pages maximum)**. Selected applicants will be invited to present their candidacy to the Editor Search Committee. Following the completion of interviews and any necessary follow-up with candidates, the Editor Search Committee will make their recommendation for the next *O&N* EiC to the *O&N*, Inc. Board of Directors. The Board of Directors anticipates selecting and appointing the new EiC in Q4 2025. Application materials must be submitted **by Tuesday, July 15, 2025**. 


NIM VITAL Facial Nerve Monitor Suggestions to Improve Sensitivity to Mechanical Stimulation

Concerns remain about less sensitivity of the NIM Vital to mechanical stimulation during mastoidectomy in comparison to the prior model (NIM 3.0) even after several software upgrades. Less sensitivity to mechanical stimulation when opening the facial recess and when exposed nerve is palpated in the facial recess have been noted by some surgeons.

A video entitled "[NIM Vital Sensitivity to Facial Nerve Mechanical Stimulation](#)" created by Nancy Young, MD is available on the AOS YouTube channel. It illustrates the potential advantage of four channel EMG recordings that include the Mentalis muscle.

Additional strategies to optimize sensitivity include 1. Use of non-insulated EMG electrodes; and 2. Lowering the default stimulation threshold and high pass filter settings. The former is located on the main monitor display and the latter is found in Settings. It is also recommended to boot up the NIM VITAL before removing the patient electrode interface to place on the operating table.

It is important to provide feedback to the *Medtronics* team supporting your institution. Additional software upgrades are planned, and feedback is essential. Reporting of concerns that include screen shots can be particularly helpful.
